Among many examples:

TYRE (Ezekiel 26)

PROPHECY: To be destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar, many nations will attack, made like a bare rock, fishermen will spread nets, debris thrown into water. All this is exactly fulfilled.

NINEVEH (Book of Nahum)

PROPHECY: To be destroyed in floods, inhabitants drunk, gates dissolved, burned down, never to be rebuilt. All this is exactly fulfilled.

JESUS

Over 300 references to the Messiah in Hebrew Scriptures were fulfilled in Jesus.

So What?

[Jesus said:] "You diligently study the Scriptures because you think that by them you possess eternal life. These are the Scriptures that testify about me, yet you refuse to come to me to have life." John 5:39-40

"There is no magic in . . . the mechanical reading of the Bible. The written Word points to the Living Word and says to us, 'go to Jesus'. If we do not go to the Jesus to whom it points, we miss the whole purpose of Bible reading. We do not worship the Bible; we worship the Christ of the Bible. Ask God to help you memorize Scripture so you can stand strong!

<u>Thursday</u>

The Bible gives me peace when I go through trials. Read Psalms 85:8; 119:114, 148.

How is God's word a refuge and shield when I meditate on its promises in times of trouble?

Have you ever had an experience when God's promises in Scripture helped you through a tough time? What happened? What specific promise helped?

Remember, it's pointless for all those comforting promises to be in the Bible if we don't know them!

Thank God today for His promises and comfort! Bring to Him the things that are robbing you of peace, and claim His promises right now for those circumstances!
