The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed this prayer: ‘I thank you, God, that I am not like other people—cheaters, sinners, adulterers. I’m certainly not like that tax collector! I fast twice a week, and I give you a tenth of my income.
– Luke 18:11-12 NLT

THIS WEEK’S MEMORY VERSE

Let us then approach God’s throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need. – Hebrews 4:16

DAILY MEDITATIONS

Brief daily readings based on this weekend’s topic:

MONDAY Read Luke 18:9-14. What are some things that stood out to you in the sermon last weekend and why? Who do you relate to more right now, the Pharisee or the tax collector? What is your biggest obstacle when it comes to asking God for mercy? *Father, I know I need your mercy and I thank you for the unlimited mercy I have in you. Remind me to throw myself on your mercy. Thank you that my salvation is not up to me!*

TUESDAY Read Isaiah 59:2, 12 and Romans 3:23. What do these verses tell you about sin? What gets in the way of you recognizing the depth of your sin? How do these verses run counter to our culture? *Lord, I admit I’m a sinner. While it’s hard for me to understand the depth of my own sin, I pray for the courage to acknowledge my sins. Lord, I pray I won’t get stuck in my sins but would continually look to your forgiveness, strength, and your ways.*

WEDNESDAY Read Proverbs 21:14, Luke 18:11-12 and James 4:6. In what way do you relate to the Pharisee? How do you struggle with pride? How can pride prevent you from seeing the truth about your sins? *Father, I do not want pride to rule my life and I don’t want to be like the Pharisee. Point out to me where pride is interfering in my relationship with you and others. Help me to see others through your eyes and not the eyes of comparison.*

THURSDAY Read Psalm 41:4, 57:1 and Luke 18:13. How do you relate to the tax collector? What changes when you follow the example of the psalmist and the tax collector and ask God for mercy? How does God’s mercy give you hope? *God, I cannot count the ways I need your mercy. Thank you for the unlimited supply of mercy I have through Jesus. Give me the desire to follow the tax collectors’ example every day.*

FRIDAY Read Isaiah 1:18, 43:25, Romans 3:24, 4:25 and Ephesians 2:8-9. What do you learn about God’s mercy and forgiveness? How could knowing about God’s mercy for you impact how you treat others? *God, “thank you” seems so inadequate when it comes to your mercy and forgiveness, but I am eternally grateful! Keep me continually aware of my need for your mercy. Give me opportunities to encourage others with the truth of your mercy and help me to reflect your heart in my relationships.*

SATURDAY Read Hebrews 4:14-16. What truth about your relationship with God and his mercy do you see? *Father, thank you for the privilege of approaching your throne. Thank you that, because of Jesus, I find mercy and help in my moment of need. I pray for the services this weekend. Please fill them with your hope and bring our church closer together.*
